Treasurer Report for 2023 Yearly Meeting

Report for end of First Three Quarters of Fiscal Year 2022-2023 (June 1, 2022 thru Feb. 28, 2023) All values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

SEYM Total Cash Flow not including Trustees

The overall cash flow of the Yearly Meeting (excluding the funds in the Trustees' care) for this period yielded a net loss of \$1,055 (excluding unrealized capital loss of \$1,175 on investments for the Publications program, and including \$12,931 restricted donations for the Field Secretary for Earthcare program). This resulted from an SEYM total real income of \$107,110 against total expenses of \$108,165.

SEYM General Fund for Administration - Cash Flow and Budget Performance

At the end of this period, the General Fund (the operations fund for which we approved a balanced budget of \$93,540 in our 2022 Yearly Meeting sessions) showed a net gain of \$1,008. This resulted from General Fund total income of \$63,397 (68% of budget) against expenses of \$62,388 (67% of budget).

NOTE: The Income & Expense Report and the Budget vs Actual Report have different income and expense totals because the Yearly Meeting collected for and disbursed to QEW \$1,325. These figures show on the Income & Expense Report, but not the Budget vs Actual Report.

Budget Support Apportionments & Contributions Received

During this period, in response to the annual request for support of the approved General Fund Budget (the Apportionments), contributions received from the Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups totaled \$49,462, or 63% of the year's budgeted request of \$78,685.

Sixteen Monthly Meetings and Ten Worship Groups were included in the Apportionment request this fiscal year. As of 2/28/2023, Nine (9) have contributed between three-quarters and their entire requested amount, one (1) has contributed one-half to three quarters, and sixteen (16) have not contributed anything.

The unrestricted individual donations received toward the Budget during this period totaled \$4,909 approximately 245% of the \$2,000 budgeted amount.

Cash Flow Results for Programs

The annual programs for this fiscal year are in progress; cash flow is incomplete.

The Publications program during this period had a net gain of \$652, excluding unrealized capital losses of \$1,175 on investments for the program.

The SEYM Field Secretary for Earthcare program during this period received \$12,931 in donations and had expenses of \$17,957, yielding a net loss of \$5,025.

Net Worth

The Net Worth of the combined Yearly Meeting and its Trustees at the end of this period was \$598,764 a decrease of \$33,622 including \$29,708 in unrealized capital losses since the beginning of the fiscal year.

The SEYM Worship & Ministry Committee continues to live out its commitment to listening to the spiritual needs of our SEYM Meetings and Worship Groups and the Yearly Meeting as a whole. We have met monthly as schedules and time permits. Outside of committee meetings, we have moved forward projects that engender our commitment to nurturing the way of Friends. A piece of wisdom that continues to encourage us in this work is:

Our way of worship evokes from deep within us at once an affirmation and a celebration, an affirmation of the reality of that Light which illumines the spiritual longing of humanity, and a celebration of the continual resurrection within us of the springs of hope and love; a sense that each of us is, if we will, a channel for a power that is both within and beyond us.

This year, we have sought to answer this spiritual longing by engaging with the following:

- 1. Organizing the Michener Lecture. This year's Michener Lecture, entitled Welcome As You Are: Seekers, Finders, Sharing the Journey, was offered by Joel Cook, who followed with a workshop on deepening our worship experience by sharing our spiritual journeys with each other.
- 2. Offering workshops at the Annual Gathering, including a two-part session on prayer, called The Divine Conversation. In addition to this two-part workshop offered through W&M, Committee members are facilitating other workshops, including one on finding inner peace, called Finding Our Way Back to Our Peaceful Self, and several sessions of Friendly Bible Study.
- 3. Planning and implementing various online opportunities for spiritual growth outside of the Yearly Meeting Gathering and the Michener Lecture, including
 - Providing Queries for the Journey to the SEYM newsletter and website for use by Meetings and individuals.
 - Providing opportunities for SEYM Friends to participate in Extended Worship experiences via Zoom. At the Yearly Meeting Gathering, we are again offering Extended Meeting for Worship.
 - Facilitating the online Seekers Book Club focusing on spiritual texts. The current book is "Practicing Peace: A Devotional Walk Through the Quaker Tradition," by Catherine Whitmire.
 - Offering online workshops on Quaker Chants, with Paulette Meier; and on Forgiveness as Spiritual Practice, with Sue Regen (upcoming in May).
- 4. The Listening Project: fostering listening and conversation around the spiritual nurture of Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups through listening sessions and follow-up.

 The Listening Project began at the request of the SEYM Executive Committee in the June 2022 Interim Business Meeting. In our interviews with Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups, we asked how SEYM could be more helpful to them. The responses come down to the following:
 - <u>Website</u>: A more intuitively organized website would be helpful. The website is difficult to navigate, making it unclear what resources, either spiritual or infrastructure-wise, are

available to Meetings.

- Clearinghouse: SEYM could serve as a clearinghouse for information about any number of topics, including
 - spiritual formation programs and other Quaker programs that Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups could take up;
 - a list of speakers/workshops that meetings might consider hosting; and 0
 - infrastructure issues.

Examples: if a Meeting is struggling with how they can do a better job of including people online in Meetings for Worship, ideally, they could contact SEYM, and SEYM could put them in touch with someone at another Meeting that has dealt with that problem to help talk them through how best to address the issue. Or if a Meeting is struggling with how to accomplish something covered in Faith & Practice, but they aren't getting the help that SEYM's Faith & Practice has promised they could get through a committee, that Meeting could contact SEYM and ask, " Who can help me with this?" Ideally, SEYM would connect that person with someone at another Meeting who has dealt with that issue previously. Several meetings mentioned how useful it would be to connect with other Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups who are experiencing the same issues or trying to accomplish similar tasks.

Serving as a convener: A key way SEYM could help Meetings and Worship Groups would be to share information about what Meetings are doing in terms of activism or spirituality or education, so that other Meetings or Worship Groups that would like to pick up that idea would know who is doing what and could consult with them potentially. Could SEYM share information, in an accessible way, on Meeting and Worship Group activities so that other Meetings could consider something similar?

In general, SEYM Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups operate as if we're each in our own orbit and not connected; we don't act as if we are one organization with a central body connecting us. To address this, SEYM could provide a thoughtfully organized website, and a central, salaried staff person whose job it would be to gather information from Meetings and Worship Groups about their activities, and post the information online in highly accessible way. We continue to hold in the Light the hearts and concerns of all Friends. SEYM Worship and Ministry.

Worship & Ministry Committee Listening Project Report Southeastern Yearly Meeting 2023 Gathering, 5th to 9th Fourth Month

The SEYM Worship & Ministry committee was asked by Executive Committee to create a Listening Project in part to create connection with monthly meetings and worship groups on behalf of SEYM, and to listen to what Friends wanted to share about experiences, needs, community, growth, and more. The Project continues, and this is the sense of the visiting so far, written in a composite form.

Some groups responded to queries, others spoke from the waiting silence, all groups shared about technology, outreach, activism, connection with other monthly meetings or worship groups, communication, community, and needs that might be addressed by SEYM. Not every group talked about a sense of Spirit within their meeting.

Technology

Zoom provided a combination of joys and sorrows from the start of the lockdown to the present time as Friends addressed the needs of their Meeting or Worship Group, and struggled with limitations, resistance, and lack of resources. Online access increased the connection for so many unable to attend in person and saw the return of some who been absent. It allowed for greater involvement in the wider Quaker world, other spiritual opportunities, and the ability to visit other monthly meetings/worship groups when before travel was prohibitive. Many mentioned that participation in community meetings such as multi-faith groups and various social justice meetings became more available through online access. Some expressed concern over the ability to feel Spirit, or connection to others. Others feel the Presence whether over Zoom or in person.

It was noted that the pandemic is not over, and with age and circumstance, various health issues including long Covid, Zoom experience is unavoidable, and should be continually improved. Some wondered if online Friends would be able to engage with Meeting, and some thought a new definition and broader understanding of participation helped to be more inviting and welcoming of all Friends.

There was a sense of growth due to online participation according to some Friends. Most meetings went to great lengths to reach and connect with Friends during the lockdown, and in the manner of trying as many ways as possible to create opportunities for worship and gathering that were safe and respectful of needs.

Some Friends considered that we are all still recovering from the Covid related period of isolation, illness, and death and this will be a process of healing—rushing into 'normal' is often heard, but that seems like avoiding truth.

Many worked hard to figure out making online worship available and adapted over time. Not all meetings had the same experience with the use of technology, and most Friends expressed a desire for connection in ways that knowledge might be shared throughout the Yearly Meeting. Some were frustrated at having to maintain Zoom as an option, or to increase opportunities for Friends via online connection.

Not everyone sees online availability as an accessibility issue, like providing ramps or wider doorways. Could technology be used to improve the sound, as there has been increased difficulty in hearing clearly when people are speaking while wearing masks.

Some Friends do not like to worship online. Some are not comfortable with worship in either setting. Some find the use of Zoom for hybrid meetings is a burden, as it doesn't allow for the facilitator to worship. This is especially problematic when one person is responsible. Other meetings found methods of sharing responsibilities through rotation or creating a different system through technology. Some Friends are uncomfortable with the idea that online access may be removed, as it is the only way due to health or circumstance that they can be among Friends. More than one Friend considered this connection a lifeline.

Outreach and Growth

Many Friends are concerned about outreach and growth. Some would like ideas and possibly assistance from SEYM, and possibly connection among other MMs/WGs to share ideas and experiences. Increasing the number of younger people in Meeting was frequently mentioned as a desire, but with few ideas of how that could happen. Many Friends are tired and feel like they are carrying too much for their Meeting, and growth could help spread out the work.

Other Friends want to increase our message to the outside world, and having more members helps with having more actions. Friends seemed clear that Quakers have much of what people are seeking, but they can't find us.

Some MMs/WGs have clear and easy-to-navigate websites that make a difference as the initial point of greeting seekers. Some Meetings are concerned about finances and loss of membership, and some Meetings/WGs feel they are thriving and growing. Some are very strong at following up with new attenders or those who show interest.

Many Friends expressed a desire to gather for fun within their Meeting and among other Meetings. Some groups create opportunities for Friends to gather in various ways and do invite others but thought that having a central way to communicate this would be helpful. Some Friends seek connection with other Friends, but aren't sure what kind, how to find it, or how it could be done. Some ask how more of these kinds of connections can be made using a hybrid model and wonder why this can't be part of the same conversation.

Activism

Many Friends spoke of engagement with local community, particularly multifaith organizations and social justice groups. Friends shared many concerns in common—homelessness, hunger, peace actions, LGBTQ support, racism, voting, gun access, being visible or involved at other events that represented our testimonies and values—executions, prisons, school boards, legislature, letter writing, making calls. Some Friends weren't sure small actions mattered, but most Friends recognize any witness as being core to our foundation, faith, and practice. Friends thought a Quaker presence was important in most actions because of our approach to non-violence, and some Friends thought it was important to have a spiritual grounding before and while taking action.

Friends spoke of balance, and wondered how to rest, heal, worship, and act. Some Friends wanted a way to connect with other Friends to have a stronger voice, and to know what other Meetings are planning. Many Friends came originally to Quakers because of activism, but some aren't sure we are doing that work today. Some actions arise organically outside of regular process due to timing, with one or two Friends showing up and other Friends joining in.

Some Friends are frustrated when a minute is sent to SEYM with an expectation that it will be shared widely, and it is not always clear that or how this happens. How do Friends know if material or information is sent to their clerk or meeting contact, but is not passed on to the Meeting? Other Friends have watched responses to time-sensitive justice concerns lose relevance because, instead of action, a minute was approved and the statement was simply a good start without follow-through.

What is needed from SEYM

Many are worried about SEYM because it seems too stretched, with the same people on many committees, and some committees not functioning at all. There is concern that the interim and annual business meetings are too focused on efficiency, and many of the SEYM decisions are addressed in a secular manner. Even some committee meetings don't include worship. Technology assistance was often mentioned, whether as a direct action by SEYM, or SEYM connecting MMs/WGs to each other to share knowledge. A coordination of which Meetings have what knowledge or success in various technology solutions would benefit everyone. This may take a very strong committee or an additional staff person to address all the potential ways in which technology use or setup could be improved so that MMs/WGs could truly make use of creative and assistive methods of connection within their group, and among others in SEYM. Friends would like to see more of the annual gathering programs as hybrid offerings.

Despite the newsletter and updated website, Friends shared that they still miss out on opportunities, or are unaware of what's going on. Is there a way to connect MMs/WGs in matters besides technology, such as handling some financial matters, how to write a grant, what common programs they might be doing, actions taking place, fun things they are doing, basically a way to share ideas and resources that is coordinated and accessible.

Many Friends liked the increase in spiritual deepening opportunities from Worship & Ministry committee; want more and for it to continue. Some Friends also expressed a desire for more intervisitation, and for it to be more visible as something that happens.

Friends were clear that SEYM Peace and Social Concerns committee needs to function. So many opportunities have been missed to raise a unified Quaker voice or response. Could the website have a section that shares what individual MMs/WGs are doing so others could join actions and shows a history of prior activism and witness over the years. AVP should be more visible within SEYM. Youth Committee and programs need more support.

Committee for Ministry on Racism (CMOR) Report Southeastern Yearly Meeting 2023 Gathering, 5th to 9th Fourth Month

The Committee for Ministry on Racism has had an especially active year in response to the racist climate fostered by the Florida government, which has made our state a national stage in the ongoing struggle for social justice. SEYM's unequivocal minute at the close of last year's annual sessions has grounded our spirit-led work.

Our Main Mission

CMOR's main mission continues to be working collaboratively towards the elimination of systemic racism and unconscious bias within our Yearly Meeting. We are committed to facilitating a workshop each year which helps us learn about ourselves and which fosters deep inclusion and unconditional love in a community of equals.

2023YM Annual Workshop: Toward a Non-Racist Future

We have collaborated with Asma Roshi, a teen leader from Orlando MM, and Aurelio Anderson, a young adult leader from Tallahassee MM, in creating an interactive workshop for this year's annual sessions: Toward A Non-Racist Future, based on shared experiences, deep listening, and collaborative strategies for a future free of racism. Another CMOR endorsed workshop by committee member Beverly Ward focuses on the Racial Wealth Gap.

Rosewood 100th Commemoration

CMOR clerk Kathy Hersh attended the 100th anniversary commemoration of the 1923 Rosewood Massacre in Levy County, Florida and shared her experience with the committee. Her connection with Dr. Marvin Dunn, a Florida Black historian and justice activist, inspired the committee to raise funds to finance Dr. Dunn's Teach the Truth bus tours, which take students, parents, and educators to sites around Florida where atrocities were committed against Blacks (Mims, Newberry, Rosewood, Ocoee.) CMOR raised \$600 to pay for seats on the bus for financially disadvantaged folks. The committee will continue to network within SEYM and Quakers nationally to raise funds for future bus tours, which highlight Florida's history of racist atrocities and counteract the state government's attempt to diminish the teaching of Black history in public schools.

Anyone wishing to contribute to the Teach the Truth bus tours and/or support the creation of a permanent park in Rosewood for healing and peace, the creation of a memorial park in Rosewood may do so by clicking on <miamicenterforracialjustice.com>.

Minute re Change of Date for WIBM/Michener

CMOR is bringing a minute to annual sessions urging a change of date for Winter Interim Business Meeting/Michener Lecture weekend from Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday commemoration weekend to another weekend so Friends are free to celebrate Dr. King's birthday and participate in community service projects and ongoing civil rights actions.

SEYM's Committee for Ministry on Racism proposes the following minute:

Southeastern Yearly Meeting minutes its intention, beginning in 2024, to change the dates of the annual Michener Lecture and the Winter Interim Business Meeting so they do not conflict with the weekend celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., on the weekend proceeding the third Monday in January.

Background

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., is the only Person of Color to be honored with a federally recognized holiday. Our Black communities celebrate this holiday with parades, teach-ins, and other community events, and see this weekend as an opportunity to showcase Black pride. When we hold our WIBM and Michener Lecture on this same weekend, we deprive ourselves from joining, supporting, and celebrating with and within our communities, with F/friends and others who have long been marginalized.

At our meeting on February 6, we agreed to urge SEYM to join in recognizing that nothing else needs to be scheduled on MLK weekend, except the life and work of Dr King and the communities he helped to uplift and empower.

Amicus Brief

CMOR is introducing a minute suggesting the creation of an amicus brief from SEYM to support the lawsuit of Florida educators against the STOP WOKE Act of the Florida legislature. We are also recommending the establishment of a relief fund to assist educators who may lose their jobs or be incarcerated for refusing to comply with this law and subsequent regulations.

Book Banning and Possible Action

CMOR is having ongoing discussions regarding the censorship of Black history materials and the banning of books related to racism and gender identity. There is wide-ranging concern among Friends regarding teachers having to remove books from their classroom libraries that have not been approved by the Florida Department of Education. At the time of this writing, there is talk of creating "underground libraries" and the teaching of forbidden subjects by religious organizations which cannot be penalized due to the Constitutional separation of church and state. CMOR member Beverly Ward, in her capacity as SEYM liaison to the Florida Council of Churches, is working with FCC Executive Director Russell Myer on an interfaith response to the Florida government's infringement on the development of a social consciousness in young people.

National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition and Model Minute

CMOR continues to track the work of the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition and its goal to create a Truth and Reconciliation Commission, which will hold hearings on the traumatic legacy of Indian boarding schools. We acknowledge that Quakers established and ran many such schools and we will continue to explore ways and means of taking responsibility for creating such ongoing pain. We will be helping publicize the work of Paula Palmer and Towards Right Relationship with Native Peoples, now affiliated with Quaker Peace Teams.

CMOR requests that SEYM consider adopting a minute concerning our YM's responsibility to support the ongoing work of the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition. Beverly Ward, Susan Taylor, and Jane Westberg will be researching any possible involvement in the past on the part of SEYM or any member meetings in endorsing or donating to the boarding schools, which were still in operation in the 1970s.

On Responsibility for Support of Boarding Schools for Indigenous Children

On May 11, 2022, the United States Department of Interior released Volume 1 of an investigative report as part of its ongoing Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative. The report outlines the forced assimilation techniques employed to erase the names, languages, religion, customs, and cultural identity of Native American children. Thousands of Native children were forced away from their families and communities and subjected to military-style discipline, forced labor, and institutionalized living in 408

federal Indian boarding schools. The report also identified burial sites where children who died at the schools were interred; the Initiative will press forward to identify all such sites. Press Release.

The initial investigation showed that approximately 50 percent of Federal Indian boarding schools may have received support or involvement from a religious institution or organization, including funding, infrastructure, and personnel. The U.S. Senate has recognized that federal funds from the 1819 Indian Civilization Fund "were apportioned among those societies and individuals—usually missionary organizations—that had been prominent in the effort to 'civilize' the Indians." "Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative Investigative Report," (May 2022), p. 11.

Quakers, both individually and as Yearly and Monthly Meetings, were directly involved in the founding, financial support, and administration of Indian boarding schools under the federal government's effort to eradicate Indian culture by eliminating all traces of Indian identity from upcoming generations.

In 2015, the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition (NABS), called upon the religious denominations to investigate their involvement in the operation of Indian boarding schools and to make amends for their complicity in this genocidal enterprise. Friend Paula Palmer was motivated by this call to do preliminary research on Quaker involvement. (See her reports at https://vimeo.com/192219802/376f2f1ddb and https://www.friendsjournal.org/quaker-indianboarding-schools/)

However, given our local and regional organizational structure, no comprehensive denominational response has yet been made by the Religious Society of Friends, nor have Yearly Meetings yet responded to the call to investigate their own records and take appropriate reparative action.

Both NABS and the Department of the Interior report call for support of pending legislation that would establish "The Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies in the U.S. Act" (H.R.5444 and S.2907). Friends Committee on National Legislation has called on Quaker organizations to voice support for this legislation, and several monthly and yearly meetings have done so. (See https://www.fcnl.org/issues/native-americans)

In the next phase of its work, the Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative will take further steps to investigate the degree to which federal funds, including monies held in Tribal trust accounts, were paid to religious organizations and institutions to operate Indian boarding schools. It will also continue to investigate where Native children have been buried.

(Note: The following is a model minute drafted and approved by Decolonizing Quakers, 2.18.22):

THEREFORE

We resolve that it is our responsibility as [insert name] Meeting to undertake a thorough and comprehensive review of our own records to determine what financial support our institution received from the federal government to operate Quaker Indigenous boarding schools;

We resolve to determine the amount of financial and material support our institution contributed for the operation of the Quaker Indigenous schools;

We resolve that it is also our responsibility to identify any graveyards where Native children may have been buried in conjunction with the operation of any Indigenous

boarding schools we ran or supported and to report our findings to NABS and the Department of the Interior;

We resolve to publish a report of our internal investigation;

We resolve to determine the value in current dollars of the money received from the federal government, and of the funds and materiel our institution contributed, for the operation of Indian boarding schools.

We resolve to apologize to the tribes and nations affected by our actions, and in consultation with them, to make reparations in a form and manner acceptable to them.

We resolve to encourage individual Friends and corporate bodies to urge their U.S. senators and representatives to cosponsor and support passage of the "Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies in the U.S. Act" (H.R. 5444 and S.2907).

The Ongoing WOKE Journey

CMOR encourages resource sharing from anyone in SEYM who has read or watched inspiring, insightful, and provocative articles, books, blogs, or programs on anti-racism.

CMOR members participated in the Tallahassee Racial Justice and Healing Series of workshops, an exceptional compilation of materials, video resources, and challenging exercises. We highly recommend this Zoom workshop series to SEYM individuals and monthly meetings as it's made available by Tallahassee MM. What a difference one Monthly Meeting can make.

Our committee members are grateful for the opportunity to serve our Yearly Meeting as we all travel along this challenging journey towards making the Quaker testimonies manifest in our daily lives.

2023 Report to Yearly Meetings

Dear Friends,

FCNL continues to carry the witness of the Spirit through nonpartisan national advocacy. I would like to share with you highlights of our work in 2023, made possible by your dedicated engagement, financial contributions, and spiritual support.

Faithfully Persisting for the World We Seek

FCNL's advocacy focuses on **peace**: creating conditions in which violence is less likely and injustice can be nonviolently repaired; **justice**: for all our neighbors; and an **earth restored**: building a just and sustainable low-carbon society that leaves no communities behind.

In the past year, FCNL has played critical roles in these areas:

Bringing congressional attention to U.S. complicity in the Saudi-led war in Yemen. Led by the more than 2,000 Advocacy Team members across the country, FCNL helped drive efforts to end support for the Saudi-led coalition responsible for a massive humanitarian crisis in Yemen. Bipartisan resolutions in both the House and Senate called for an end to unauthorized U.S. support of the war. Although U.S. support for the Saudis continues, momentum continues to build in opposition.

Addressing the legacy of Indian boarding schools.

Quakers were among those who collaborated with the U.S. government in the 19th and 20th centuries to run schools intended to "assimilate" Native children into white society. Now, FCNL is focusing on building congressional support for bipartisan legislation to establish a Truth and Healing Commission to uncover what took place. This legislation has been the focus of the young organizers in the 2022–23 Advocacy Corps.

Advancing environmental justice and addressing climate change. FCNL was part of nearly two years of advocacy resulting in far-reaching climate legislation becoming law. The Inflation Reduction Act (P. L.117-169) puts the United States on the path to cut greenhouse gas emissions by 40% in the next eight years. This bill, along with the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (P. L. 117-58), increases investment in supporting communities most impacted by pollution.

Compensating for Nuclear Testing Exposure.

A program to compensate people exposed to radiation through U.S. nuclear tests, so-called "downwinders," was set to expire in July 2022. FCNL worked to secure passage of legislation to extend the program for two years and to broaden the eligibility to include additional states affected by the more than 200 above-ground nuclear tests the United States conducted in the 1940s.

We also continue to advocate for diplomacy and peacebuilding to bring about a just solution to the **war in Ukraine**. See *fcnl.org/issues* for additional advocacy updates.

Discerning FCNL Priorities and Policy Directions

Shifting the Narrative for Peace

Through the **Dismantling Racism and Militarism** in U.S. Foreign Policy project, FCNL's Diana Ohlbaum and Salih Booker from the Center for International Policy took apart the "racism-militarism paradigm" that sees the world in a rigid racial hierarchy and embraces militarism as the most effective way to maintain social order. Through expert consultations and community discussion, FCNL is advancing efforts to dismantle these systems. Read the report and find out more at fcnl.org/drm.

This systemic focus extends throughout the organization. FCNL's recommitment to antiracism, anti-bias, justice, diversity, equity, and **inclusion** in all aspects of our work is reflected in our statement, available at fcnl.org/ajedi. It guides our internal systems and practices as well as our lobbying and other activities.

Strengthening Our Democracy

FCNL is working to reduce partisanship, transform relationships, and promote substantive policy change to strengthen our democracy and address the root causes of division and partisanship in our country. Political polarization and entrenched systems of oppression threaten U.S. democracy, as well as FCNL's advocacy and effective government equipped to respond to the challenges of our country and world.

FCNL brings its 80 years of experience in nonpartisan, relationship-based advocacy. It is uniquely placed to strengthen cooperative, nonpartisan civic engagement and build bridges across political divisions to advance policy solutions.

We are deepening bipartisan relationships with Congress by drawing on the skills of our grassroots advocates in deep listening. We are also building new partnerships with networks such as Braver Angels, Faiths United to Save Democracy, and the TRUST Network.

Principled Hospitality on Capitol Hill

In February 2023, Friends Place on Capitol Hill, formerly known as William Penn House, marked its first anniversary of welcoming overnight guests. The Quaker learning center and guesthouse has hosted 90 groups and more than 1,600 guests. As part of the local migrant solidarity mutual aid network, Friends Place has also hosted more than 600 migrants bussed from the southern border. More at friendsplacedc.org.

Field Secretary for Earthcare (FSE) Report Southeastern Yearly Meeting 2023 Gathering, 5th – 9th Fourth Month

Overview

Provide focus and coordinate efforts on environmental work in the Southeastern Yearly Meeting (SEYM) region.

I am pleased to provide a recap of the activities undertaken to carry out the work as field secretary for Earthcare since last year's Gathering. This report also is an update on work activities since the report submitted for Winter Interim Business Meeting 2023. The report includes plans for the upcoming year. I am deeply grateful for your support in this work.

Communication with the Anchoring Committee

I continue to communicate with the FSE Anchoring Committee members through email, telephone, or other remote means, including in person! During the upcoming year, I plan to reach out more to the Committee with the goal of engaging members in creating online content. It may be of interest to Friends to learn of the members' thoughts, concerns, and leadings on Earthcare.

Meeting with Monthly Meetings (MMs), Worship Groups (WGs), and Others

Perform visits to Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups within SEYM to help them discern their leadings in care of the Earth, and to provide information and coordination among Meetings. As a reminder, "Meetings can issue invitations to the [SEYM] administrative secretary, FSE, or the Anchor Committee [for FSE visits]. We will all conference over the invitation and subsequent planning" (Phoebe Andersen, 3 Tenth Month 2016). I continue e-visits via Zoom or other online platforms and where possible, in person.

Suggested Workshop/Event Topics

- Angelic Troublemaking: Beyond Bystander Training explores anti-racism/decolonization work with emphasis on local concerns and means of accompaniment;
- Climate Equity/Climate Justice in Our Community: identifies specific local social justice and equity concerns. Participants identify actions to address concerns;
- *New* Decolonizing Earthcare: explores the intersectionality of gender, race, extraction, and harmful economic systems and the adverse impacts to the Earth.
- Discerning Earthcare Leadings: listening and sharing experiences to reach individual and group decisions on Earthcare actions;
- Earthcare audits: baseline assessment of individual or community activities and discernment;

- Equality or Equity? What is Our Testimony?: examines Friends' equality testimony, the concepts of equity and justice, and the relationship of these to Earthcare;
- Permaculture is Not Just Agriculture: introduces permaculture design and domains and ways to bring these practices into Earthcare;
- Project Drawdown, Introduction and more: presents information on actions that "drawdown" carbon emissions and ways to promote drawdown choices as individuals and communities;
- Quakers and Climate Collapse: shares and builds on a Woodbrooke course led by Jackie Carpenter from 2021 Fifth Month (May), including review of the latest science, worship sharing, and discernment.
 - o I also can build on my Pendle Hill presentation to help with local concerns;
- Racial Wealth Gap Simulation: an exercise that helps "...people understand the connections among racial equity, hunger, poverty, and wealth";
- Transportation, migration, and climate: explores access and mobility issues from the local to global perspective and the impacts of climate change;
- Underwater Homeowners Association: shares local actions that can be undertaken by communities experiencing sea level rise;
- Water: Sea Level Rise, Flooding, and Water Quality explores local, national, and global water
- Waterline Communities: Displacement and Gentrification and Why Quakers Should Care drills down to the county or community level on the impacts of displacement; and
- What the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs AND Inflation Reduction Acts Mean to Me and My Community? This workshop looks at how funds from the two acts are being dispersed at the local level and provides suggestions on how to get involved in the decision-making process. Special emphasis is given to working with local implementing agencies and collaborating with advocacy groups to address adverse climate and environmental impacts.

Recap of Meetings with Monthly Meetings (MMs), Worship Groups (WGs), and Others

Since the 2022 Annual Gathering, I have made more than four virtual visits with Monthly Meetings, Worship Groups, and others. This includes workshops related to the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and the Inflation Reduction Act, peace and social concerns and Earthcare discernment, and climate justice. These visits were distinct invitations to address issues identified by the Meetings or Worship Groups. Additional virtual visits were made as a means of keeping in contact and to participate in activities organized by Meetings or Worship Groups. One example is participation in the five-week Racial Justice and Healing Series hosted by the Tallahassee Friends Meeting during Fall 2022. By participating in these activities, I support the work of the Meetings and share resources. I find it to be a useful way to see and show how our concerns are linked and how we can be collaborative in our work.

Meetings since Winter Interim Business Meeting and Planned Meetings:

George Lakey, Lessons for Today from a Lifetime of Nonviolent Activism, 10 First Month (January) 2022

George Lakey provided a second virtual talk, "Meeting Our Challenges Together, with Courage", with more than 65 registrants. Again, this was an effort among Friends across the State that made the event possible. George Lakey talked for about 30 minutes and, again, spent an hour responding to questions and comments. A link to the recording will be available on the SEYM website.

Deland Worship Group to be scheduled

The discussions with Deland WG attendees continue. There is overlap between this work and that of the Committee for the Ministry on Racism as I am a member of the committee and the clerk of the committee, Kathy Hersh, and I are known for getting into "necessary trouble." Kathy Hersh and I met in person on 1 Second Month to discuss work with Deland Worship group and the community. It is anticipated that these activities may be a model for other Meetings and Worship Groups and that there may be opportunities for Yearly Meeting-wide initiatives. Some potential activities include:

- Collecting African-American books and other books related to "banned" subjects for churches or local organizations to distribute;
- Creating Little Free Libraries, https://littlefreelibrary.org/. Little Free Libraries has a "Read in Color" Program that "...distributes books that provide perspectives on racism and social justice; celebrate BIPOC, LGBTQ+, and other marginalized voices; and incorporate experiences from all identities for all readers." See the Read in Color page, https://littlefreelibrary.org/programs/read-in-color/. There also is an Indigenous Library Program, https://littlefreelibrary.org/programs/indigenous-library-program/.
- Developing or supporting local "Stay Woke" actions: this could include supporting rallies, speaking at public meetings, writing letters to newspapers, etc.
- Supporting Dr. Marvin Dunn's "Teach the Truth" tours, https://miamicenterforracialjustice.org/teach-the-truth-tour-january-2023/.

Interactions or Collaborations between and among other SEYM committees

These interactions between and among SEYM committees help to facilitate communication and collaboration of our regional concerns with national organizations and to be a Quaker Presence at specific events.

Recap of Interactions or Collaborations

Throughout the SEYM year, there were opportunities to interact or otherwise work with other Yearly Meeting committees. This includes, but is not limited to, the Youth Committee, Peace and Social Concerns, and CMOR. As suggested above, the Earthcare work is in support of all the work of the Yearly Meeting.

- The Committee for Ministry on Racism (CMOR): CMOR will meet 6 Third Month. As mentioned above a number of actions for the committee have been discussed that overlap with the work the Deland Worship Group. Chief among these is the support of Dr. Dunn's tours and his lead of the "woke mob." The Committee's report has additional information on support of Dr. Dunn's work in Florida and actions to work with indigenous people. As part of the 2023 SEYM Gathering, I will facilitate simulation workshop on the racial wealth gap to support CMOR's workshop;
- Earthcare Committee: I continue work with the Committee on an individual and small group bases. During the 2023 Annual Gathering, I will facilitate a workshop, Preparedness 101: Zombie Apocalypse. Because, "If you're prepared for a zombie apocalypse, you're prepared for any emergency.";

Florida Council of Churches (FCC): The Florida Council of Churches has begun its work for the 2023 legislative session. Dr. Russell Meyer, FCC Executive Director, is also a board member of the Florida People's Advocacy Center, https://www.floridapac.org/.

The Florida People's Advocacy Center (Florida PAC) increases social and economic justice throughout Florida by facilitating and providing training in civic engagement at the state capitol. Our motto is "Get involved. The world is run by those who show up!";

- On 14 and 15 Second Month (February), I participated in faith leader advocacy days in Tallahassee. The afternoon of the 14th advocacy training was offered on forthcoming legislation. The 14th also was the fifth-year commemoration of the Parkland shooting. A memorial prayer service was hosted that evening by FCC where the Litany in the Wake of a Mass Shooting, https://bishopsagainstgunviolence.org/liturgical_resource/litany-inthe-wake-of-a-mass-shooting/. On February 15, I participated in the march and rally, Rally to Save Our [Black] History. Following the rally, there was a viewing of "Loudmouth", the documentary about Reverend Al Sharpton and a broadcast of "The Reidout", Joy Reid's MSNBC program from the Bethel Missionary Baptist Church in Tallahassee.
- Peace and Social Concerns (PSC) Committees: I met with the SEYM PSC Committee on 25 Second Month to update the committee on work with the Florida Council of Churches as the committee sat in discernment with its work. I plan to continue to meet with the committee;
- Quaker United Nations Office (QUNO), AFSC: Bill Carlie and I now share SEYM appointments to AFSC. I am an AFSC representative on the Quaker United Nations Committee (QUNC);
- Right Sharing of World Resources: I continue to share information through the QEW United Nations Working Group, AFSC, and Quaker United Nations Committee.
- Youth Committee: I continue to work with the Youth Committee. I hope to have strong youth participation in the Preparedness 101 workshop at annual gathering. The youth have the knowledge!!!

The Wider Quaker World, Interfaith Groups, Other Environmental Organizations

To communicate and collaborate our regional concerns with national organizations including Quaker Earthcare Witness (QEW), Earth Quaker Action Team (EQAT), Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL), and Friends General Conference (FGC). To be a Quaker Presence at specific events, including those arranged by others.

I continue to work with the wider Quaker World, interfaith groups, and environmental organizations. These interactions have been virtual during this period. While there were many of these throughout the year most were virtual. Slowly, as noted elsewhere, in-person and hybrid visits are beginning to increase.

- Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP): I remain in contact with AVP facilitators in Florida and beyond. There seems to be interest in restarting in-person workshops. More on this soon, hopefully;
- American Friends Service Committee (AFSC): I continue to serve as a corporate member of AFSC, QUNC and AFSC's Third World Coalition. I participated virtually in QUNC's Second Month 2023 Meeting. This purpose of this meeting was to focus on the governance role of QUNC and to help staff and committee members better understand the callings. This was important as both the New York and Geneva offices of QUNO have undergone staff changes and implementation of a new strategic plan within the last 18 months.
- Decolonizing Quakers, https://www.decolonizingquakers.org/: The Indigenous and Friends of African descent affinity groups continue discernment on the meaning of "decolonizing."

- o I met with the Toward Right Relationship with Native Peoples (TRR) Advisory Group on 30 First Month. One of the asks of the group is that we help to promote the offerings of Toward Right Relationship. I encourage friends to visit the website, Toward Right Relationship with Native Peoples, https://friendspeaceteams.org/trr/.

- Earth Ethics Institute (EEI), http://earthethicsinstitute.org/, Miami Dade College: I met virtually with the board on 15 Second Month. has only convened one virtual meeting since I was accepted. We are in the process of planning an annual meeting for late Spring 2023.
- Fellowship of Friends of African Descent (FOFAD): the work of Decolonizing Quakers overlaps with the FOFAD activities and the Black Quaker Project, https://www.theblackquakerproject.org/.
 - The 2023 Black Quaker Lives Matter Film Festival, Forum Screening and Discussion is underway through 8 Fourth Month (April) 2023, https://www.theblackquakerproject.org/2023-film-festival-forum.
- Florida Interfaith Climate Actions Network (FL-iCAN): Jan Booher continues to work with the Florida Disaster Resilience Initiative, (https://resiliencesystem.org/dashboards/florida-disaster-resilience-initiative/) and share health and environmental information, including COVID-19.
- Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL): Brad Stocker and I continue to share a slot as representatives to FCNL for QEW.

Collaborative prospects:

One recent focus has been developing collaborative relationships with like-minded organizations. The Broward County League of Women Voters is focusing on environmental issues, and initial conversations have been promising.

Earthcare in Challenged Communities

It has been reported that that people who are active in the environmental movement are mostly middleclass, with few working-class or poor people.

As Covid becomes better controlled, the prospect of "taking Earthcare ideas to challenged communities," can be revisited.

Infrastructure is one issue. In one financially challenged community, most buildings were low-rise apartment buildings; except for one community center. The neighborhood is cut off from the main part of the city by a major street.

Next steps are to visit the community center and contact the city to learn how that community is represented and served by local government.

Landfill Issues

Government landfills, for example, Broward County's Landfills, are nearing capacity, and new solutions are being sought.

Organizations like Global Citizen indicate that this is a national problem, and that the bulk of the 2,000 active landfills in the U.S. are "filling up."

China now refuses to accept low-grade, difficult-to-recycle plastics, adding to the problem.

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
