MINUTES

First Plenary Session Fifth Day, Third Month, Day 24, 2016 – 4:15 p.m.

Friends gathered and settled into worshipful, attentive silence to begin the first plenary session.

Seated at the Clerk's table for this and subsequent sessions were Joel Cook, (Palm Beach MM), acting clerk; Nancy Triscritti (Tampa MM) acting assistant clerk; and Jan Dahm and Lisa Erazmus, (Tampa MM), recording co-clerks.

Assistant clerk read from the following: A Testament of Devotion, by Thomas Kelly

"The basic response of the soul to the Light is internal adoration and joy, thanksgiving and worship, self-surrender and listening. The secret places of the heart cease to be our noisy workshop. They become a holy sanctuary of adoration and of self-oblation, where we are kept in perfect peace, if our minds be stayed on Him who has found us in the upward springs of our life. And in brief intervals of overpowering visitation we are able to carry the sanctuary frame of mind out into the world, into its turmoil and its fitfulness, and in a hyperaesthesia of the soul, we see all mankind tinged with deeper shadows, and touched with Galilean glories. Powerfully are the springs of our will moved to an abandon of singing love toward God; powerfully are we moved to a new and overcoming love toward time-blinded men and all creation. In this Center of Creation, all things are ours, and we are Christ's and Christ is God's. We are owned men, ready to run and not be weary and to walk and not faint."

Assistant clerk read from SEYM Faith and Practice - Section for 12th Month Queries on Peace Testimony and Non-violence:

- Do we work for peace in the world? Do we nurture peace within ourselves?
- Do we "live in the virtue of that life and power which takes away the occasion of all wars"?
- Do we seek consistently to carry out this testimony for peace in all our relationships, including family, community, and work life?
- Do we as individuals and as members of a meeting seek to take part in the ministry of reconciliation between individuals, groups, and nations?
- Do we faithfully maintain our peace testimony?
- Do we reject military training, preparation for war, and participation in war as inconsistent with the spirit of Christ's teachings?
- Do we as a meeting take a stand and do all we can to remove the causes of war and violence?

June EC 2015 Numbered Minutes

15FIBM01 Southeastern Yearly Meeting would like to thank Saint Petersburg Monthly Meeting for hosting Fall Interim Business Meeting. You have made us feel welcome in every possible way.

Friends gathered and settled into worshipful, attentive silence to begin the fourth plenary session.

Assistant clerk, read from A Testament of Devotion, by Thomas Kelly:

"The experience of Divine Presence wholly satisfies, and there are a few who, like those on the Mount of Transfiguration, want to linger there forever and never return to the valleys of men, where there are demons to be cast out. But there is more to the experience of God than that of being plucked out of the world. The fuller experience, I am sure, is of a Love which sends us out into the world. "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you" becomes, not an external, Biblically authorized command, but a living, burning experience. For the experience of an inflooding, all-enfolding Love, which is at the center of Divine Presence, is of a Love which embraces all creation, not just our little, petty selves. "Would that all men might be even as I am," are the words of a man such as John Hughes used to call an authentic. Not only does all creation have a new smell, as Fox found, but it has a new value, as enwrapped in the infinite Love of God, wherein not a sparrow falls to the around without the Father. Have you experienced this concern for the sparrow's fall? Nor is it His inference about God's tender love; it is the record of His experience in God. There is a tendering of the soul toward everything in creation, from the sparrow's fall to the slave under the lash. The hard-lined face of a money-bitten financier is as deeply touching to the tendered soul as are the burned-out eyes of miners' children, remote and unseen victims of his so-called success. There is a sense in which, in this terrible tenderness, we become one with God and bear in our quivering souls the sins and burdens, the benightedness and the tragedy of the creatures of the whole world, and suffer in their suffering, and die in their death."

Treasurer Report to Annual Sessions 2016

Report for Fiscal Year 2015-16 through end of Third Quarter (Values to nearest dollar) (June 1, 2015, through February 29, 2016)

SEYM Total Cash Flow (not including Trustees)

The overall cash flow of the Yearly Meeting (excluding the Trustees' accounts) for this period vielded a net income (excluding unrealized capital gains/losses) of \$30.631. including \$9,030 restricted donations for the Field Secretary for Earthcare program. This resulted from a total real income of \$78,178 against total expenses of \$47,547 and reflects the in-progress status of the SEYM Annual Sessions.

SEYM General Fund for Administration - Cash Flow and Budget Performance

At the end of this period, the General Fund (with a zero-net budget of \$67,800) showed a net income of \$10,880. This resulted from General Fund total income of \$49,520 (73% of budget) against expenses of \$38,641 (57% of budget).

Budget Support - Apportionments & Contributions Received

Contributions received in response to the annual Apportionments request to Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups for support of the General Fund Budget now total \$39,214, or 67% of the year's budgeted request of \$58,290.

Sixteen Monthly Meetings and three Worship Groups were included in the Apportionment request this year. By the end of Third Quarter five (5) had contributed their entire requested amount and eight (8) more had contributed one-third to three-quarters.

Of the nineteen requests, six (6) are unanswered so far.

In addition, a Worship Group that is not a part of the Apportionment request has made a \$400 unrestricted contribution.

Individual unrestricted donations to date total \$1,634 (82% of the \$2,000 budget).

Results for Programs

Half Yearly Meeting had a net expense of \$6.44, covered from the General Fund. Michener Lecture accounts are still open; a positive net income is forecast.

Annual Sessions for this year are in process; the accounts are still open.

Publications Program during this period had a net real income of \$467, excluding unrealized capital losses of \$842 on program investments.

Programs for Youth during this period had no expenses and a \$3,042 net income. yielding net assets to date of \$5,675.

The SEYM Field Secretary for Earthcare program received \$9,030 during this period in donations and had no cash expenses, yielding net assets of \$17,360 at end of February.

Net Worth

The Net Worth of the combined Yearly Meeting and its Trustees at the end of February was \$529,000, an increase of \$5,029 (reflecting \$26,881 of unrealized capital losses) since the beginning of the fiscal year.

Trustees' Report for SEYM Gathering • March, 2016

SEYM Trustees met at all of our Interim business meetings this year.

We reviewed and updated some of the investments SEYM has intrusted unto our care.

We took whatever steps necessary to evaluate the investments and made small changes to reflect our understanding of trustees' fiduciary responsibilities.

Trustees took the wishes of the Yearly Meeting sessions on supporting the Field Secretary for Earthcare (FSE) and committed \$10,000.00 to support the FSE position for its first year in operation. This Fall we moved that commitment into our 2016-17 budget as the FSE position has just begun the search committee function minuted and approved at 2015 sessions.

The extra time was necessary to raise the requisite funds to adequately insure the FSE's work. Trustees will evaluate the effectiveness of the FSE position over its first full year in operation before discerning any other year support from trustees' budget.

Clerk of Trustees has fielded many inquiries as to the nature and ability of trustees to support projects that percolate from the Monthly Meetings. I need to remind Friends that the majority of our funds are restricted in nature owing to the donor's wishes, and therefore are not available for work outside of their intended purpose. Nevertheless Trustees are able to meet the standing commitments we have made using the income and dividends from the investments we hold for the Yearly Meeting.

In this regard I would remind Friends that if a certain project were the goal of a group of Friends then please be sure that leading comes from a Monthly Meeting committee; is approved and minuted by that Monthly Meeting in a Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business; and is brought to an Interim Meeting for Business so the Executive Committee may discern if it needs to initiate the lengthy process of all Monthly Meeting discernment.

Peace & Social Concerns Committee Report

AVP Support

The committee affirms its support for growing Alternatives to Violence Project work in SEYM. Jacksonville Friends have begun the labor of gathering and training a core group of facilitators in their city. In this they have had the loving support of St. Petersburg, Tampa and Clearwater Friends, as well as a gift of financial support--our committee's unused budgeted money. Their work is going well, and approaching the point where they could have local facilitators trained. Recognizing that as a starting place from which crucial work can be done to build a community of peace there, and recognizing the limited resources available, our committee asks SEYM to contribute \$250 of the Peace and Social Concerns Committee budget towards AVP work in Jacksonville now.

Survey Monkey

The committee appreciates the effort to survey Friends of SEYM by Peace and Social Concerns committee's incoming committee co-clerk Elaine Martin. The committee approved requesting SEYM to make it possible for the committee to use Survey Monkey to continue this effort to discern concerns of SEYM Friends.

C.I.W. support

Many Friends saw the movie FOOD CHAINS at SEYM on 3/23/2016, and many Friends marched in the Coalition of Immokalee Workers protest for fair treatment of Florida farmworkers. Last year we believe SEYM found \$100 for C.I.W. Our committee asks for SEYM to renew this and send another \$100 to C.I.W.

AFSC Representatives' Report

Interim Report: Annual Corporation Meeting of American Friends Service Committee, Philadelphia, PA, March 3-5, 2016

About one hundred Quaker representatives from around the United States attended the annual Corporation meeting of American Friends Service Committee, coming up on its centennial in 2017. The theme of the meeting was Change the Story, Change the World: Telling the truth about militarism in U.S. communities and around the world.

The meeting got off to a rousing start on the evening of March 3 with The Rev. Dr. William Barber, II, speaking on "Moral Mondays, police militarization and working for justice." The agenda program described Rev. Barber as "president of the North Carolina NAACP [and] a charismatic, populist Southern preacher with fire in his voice and love in his heart. Every Monday, Barber and thousands of others gather for 'Moral Monday' at the Halifax Mall outside the state legislature in Raleigh, North Carolina, to speak out against what Barber calls 'immoral politics.'" Rev. Barber called for "the third Reconstruction" (after the post-Civil War Reconstruction and the Civil Rights Movement) to resist immoral politics and police brutality.

In the two following days workshops with AFSC staff continued with the meeting's theme: (1) "Transformative Justice: Directly countering retributive justice paradigms"; (2) "Welcoming Immigrants and Refugees: Responding to Islamophobia and Anti-Immigrant Sentiment"; (3) "No Way to Treat a Child: Working to end the detention of Palestinian children by Israel"; (4) "Humanize not Militarize: Responses and Resistance to Militarism"; and (5) "Shared Security with QUNO: Working for peace in an interdependent world."

One day started with unprogrammed worship and the next day with programmed worship well led by Pam and Ron Ferguson from the Evangelical branch of Quakerism. The meeting also included reports from Treasurer Susan Cozzens, Clerk Phil Lord, and General Secretary Shan Cretin, who spoke directly on the meeting's theme, citing AFSC's agricultural program in North Korea as an example of changing the narrative.

Besides the reports, business sessions for the Corporation consisted mainly of rubberstamping the Standing Nominating Committee's nominees for Corporation members-at-large, the Board of Directors, and Friends Relations Committee, with an emphasis on affirmative action. An annual ad hoc committee proposes nominees to the Standing Nominating Committee, who can occasionally generate controversy.

There was a little excitement in the South regional meeting when I noted that its programs, while exemplary, were overwhelmingly urban. I recommended reading Paul Theroux's travel book Deep South (2015). I sometimes feel that almost all the people at the AFSC annual meetings are urban-oriented: If you dropped them off in the country, they would never find their way home.

Finally, the Corporation's official epistle was not approved and is currently undergoing editing, which is why I am writing this interim report. Eventually the edited version of the epistle should be mailed out to yearly meetings.

Friends Peace Teams Report

Friends Peace Teams continues its extraordinary grass roots peacework in countries around the world that are dealing with civil wars and other violence on a daily basis. Using the leadership skills of its many volunteers in coordination with local leaders FPT offers dozens of workshops every month: AVP (Alternatives to Violence Project), trauma resiliency, HROC (Healing and Rebuilding Our Communities), and other peacebuilding programs.

Since its beginning 22 years ago, your generous support of FPT makes this makes peace possible.

African Great Lakes Initiative

The African Great Lakes Initiative conducted two successful Healing and Restoring our Community international trainings in Rwanda and introduced HROC to the Kakuma Refugee Camp in northwestern Kenya.

In Burundi AGLI addressed the conflict surrounding the election for a third term of the current president by conducting citizen reporting, peace and democracy groups and peace dialogues.

In Mt. Elgon, Kenya, a peace team has made contacts with the former Saboat Land Defense Force rebels and worked on reintegrating them into their community they damaged.

In Rwanda, the Children Peace Libraries continued with training in peer mediation for the librarians at the Peace Libraries. The Kamenge Clinic in Burundi has provided expanded services to the community, such as programs with rape survivors, seminars on family planning, particularly with individuals who are HIV positive.

Peacebuilding en las Américas

Peacebuilding *en las Américas* continued an extensive program of Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP) workshops in Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras and Colombia.

In Colombia, the program in the Central Region (Bogotá) began to develop programs in poor communities of displaced people in conjunction with municipal authorities. A group of Franciscan Sisters working throughout the country have joined in presenting AVP workshops in a variety of communities.

In Honduras, one group is working with poor communities in San Pedro Sula and el Progreso, a prison, and with youth at risk in a local middle school. Another Honduran group has trained seven inmate facilitators and worked with local teachers. Nelly Del Cid is working with indigenous Tolupanes (indians) and Garifuna communities which are resisting encroachments on their lands.

In El Salvador, our partners have worked with several groups of at-risk youth.

In Guatemala, in partnership with the American Friends Service Committee, a program with staff of a girls' juvenile detention center was initiated and the Peace School program in Chimaltenango, an alternative middle school, was expanded to include weekly peace activities in addition to the regular AVP workshops.

Both El Salvador and Guatemala AVP groups participated in a successful pilot program with a large international child sponsorship program., We hope that AVP can be used throughout this program and its 65 additional countries.

Our founding Coordinator, Val Liveoak, stepped down at the end of 2015 and we are seeking her a new coordinator.

Asia West Pacific

When the massive earthquake struck Nepal in April of 2015, Asia West Pacific volunteers were leading AVP workshops. We immediately started work with our local contacts to identify needs for relief that were ignored by other organizations, and raised and distributed \$50,562 for relief.

Other accomplishments include:

- a translation of Quaker and AVP materials into Indonesian
- the film *Silaturahmi* (the Power of Visiting) was released and made available for group showing http://consciencestudio.com
- a new program of local support for Bhutanese refugees who have relocated to the United States
- co-hosting with AVP Korea advanced AVP workshops
- publication of *The Power of Goodness*, a book of worldwide peace stories illustrated by the children of Chechnia during the Russian invasion of 1995
- our third annual international training for Peace was held in Indonesia with participants from five countries across the region
- continuing support for the people of Barak Induk, Indonesia, who are being displaced from land they have worked for fifteen years
- translation of the AVP Basic Manual into the local language of the Philippines, Visayas
- maintained partnerships with other organizations in the development and production of water filters in Indonesia
- partnered in a series of trauma resiliency and basic AVP workshops in Israel, the West Bank, and Gaza
