MINUTES

The meeting began with worship at 7:00 pm.

Membership Recorder

Ed Lesnick reported as membership recorder. We have received reports from 8 meetings, with 2 that have asked for more time. The reports are due tomorrow.

We accepted the report of the Membership Recorder.

Nominating Committee

Ed Lesnick reported for the Nominating Committee. There were fewer positions that needed filling this year. Archives Committee needs assistance, especially with negotiating stairs. If there is someone able to asssist at UF Gainesville, please contact Bill Rath (clerk) or Phoebe Andersen. Ed noted that there are Friends who are stepping down at Yearly Meeting Gathering or before. Brian Olsen will become clerk Nominating Committee. We accept the report of the Nominating Committee.

Treasurer's Report

Joel Cook gave the highlights of the Treasurer's report. Cash flow looks worse than it is because we have paid an \$18,000 deposit to Dayspring for the Gathering. For a number of years, we have run a deficit. We cannot continue this indefinitely. We need to step up apportionment payments—more than half of the meetings pay nothing or close to nothing. Friends accepted the report with gratitude.

Dan Vaughen reported for on the ad hoc Organizational Documents Review Committee. Cheryl Demers-Holton has had to resign. Neil Andersen has been added to the committee.

Treasurer Report for 2024 Winter Interim Business Meeting

Report for end of First Half of Fiscal Year 2023-2024 (June 1 thru November 30, 2023) All values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

SEYM Total Cash Flow not including Trustees

The overall cash flow of the Yearly Meeting (excluding the Trustees' accounts) for this period yielded a net loss of \$22,316. This resulted from an SEYM total real income of \$57,729 against total expenses of \$80,044.

SEYM General Fund for Administration - Cash Flow and Budget Performance

At the end of this period, the General Fund (the operations fund for which we approved a balanced budget of \$115,640 in our 2023 Yearly Meeting sessions) showed a net loss of \$11,137. This resulted from General Fund total income of \$43,728 (38% of budget) against expenses of \$54,866 (47% of budget).

Budget Support Apportionments & Contributions Received

During this period, in response to the annual request for support of the approved General Fund Budget (the Apportionments), contributions received from the Monthly Meetings and Worship Groups totaled \$35,114, or 34% of the year's budgeted request of \$103,175.

Fifteen (15) Monthly Meetings and seven (7) Worship Groups were included in the Apportionment request this fiscal year. So far, one (1) has contributed between 76% and 100%, three (3) have contributed 51% to 75%, five (5) have contributed 26% to 50%, one (1) has contributed between 1% and 25%, and twelve (12) have not contributed anything.

The unrestricted individual donations received toward the Budget during this period totaled \$2,193, approximately 55% of the \$4,000 budgeted amount.

Cash Flow Results for Programs

The annual programs for this fiscal year are in progress; cash flow is incomplete.

The Publications program during this period had a net real loss of \$1,588.

Net Worth

The Net Worth of the combined Yearly Meeting and its Trustees at the end of this period was \$559,959.12, a decrease of \$26,622 including \$6,369 in unrealized capital losses since the beginning of the fiscal year.

Ad hoc Committee on Organizational Documents Report **SEYM Winter Interim Business Meeting** 20 First Month 2024

At FIBM 2023, an Ad Hoc Committee was appointed to review and update SEYM's organizational documents. Insert the exact language from the minutes, if available.

Ed Lesnick, Phoebe Andersen, Cheryl Demers-Holton, and Dan Vaughen were approved as members of the committee.

Since its appointment, the committee has met three times. Dan Vaughen agreed to serve as Clerk and Recording Clerk.

One member, Cheryl Demers-Holton, has withdrawn from the committee for health reasons. Neil Andersen has offered to join the committee. The committee will ask for approval of those changes in membership at Winter Interim Business Meeting.

The committee has collected editable versions of the SEYM Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, and the Operational Handbook. It has started work on the Bylaws and the Operational Handbook.

Because the Articles of Incorporation are fairly standard for Florida Not For Profit Corporations, and because the language used to customize them for our purposes is sufficiently broad, the committee plans to work first on the other two documents. Near the end of their work on those two documents, the committee will consider whether any changes in the Articles of Incorporation might be needed.

Persons and committees whose work is addressed in the current Operational Handbook are requested to stay in close touch during this process with the members of this committee. Please let us know how best to contact you. Please also respond promptly to our inquiries.

The committee is considering comments already submitted., We are reaching out to committee clerks and other interested persons to update previously submitted comments, and to provide additional suggestions based on current practice.

The committee is working on provisions in the handbook relating to several committees and officers. We plan to remove provisions relating to Pro Nica, the Life Enrichment Center, and the Pendle Hill Scholarship Fund. We plan to add part-time positions to provide expertise in technology and in Internet marketing, a cocoordinator for the Annual Gathering Youth Program, and to address the recently added position of Yearly Meeting Bookkeeper.

We need a description and mission statement for the Committee on Racism and updated suggestions from those who hold current membership on the Finance Committee, Trustees, and the Treasurer. For the last three, interested persons should communicate directly with Neil Andersen, who has accepted primary responsibility for drafting updates for those sections.

We are hoping to have a first draft of at least some sections of these organizational documents ready for review at WIBM.

Ad hoc Committee on Organizational Documents Supplemental Report **SEYM Winter Interim Business Meeting** 20 First Month 2024

While working on the SEYM Operational Handbook with the SEYM Ad Hoc Committee on Organizational Documents, I noticed this provision from the section pertaining to expenses and reimbursements for the YM Clerk:

Expenses, Reimbursements, and Budget:

Expenses include costs of traveling to YM events, YBM Gathering, IBM, and EC meetings, phone calls, and postage.

SEYM's policy is that travel expenses (mileage, room, board) to SEYM functions will NOT be reimbursed. Reimbursement is made for postage, supplies, and tele-phone calls from the Executive Committee line item of the YM General Fund budget.

Clerk may make a request to the Executive Committee for full or partial travel funding to the Clerk's Conference; the EC considers the request in light of the YM's ability to pay within the General Fund Budget.

The SEYM ad hoc Committee on Organizational Documents is not in unity about the merits of this policy, or whether it is even within their purview to review. The Committee is, however, in unity that this policy is a matter within the purview of EC.

Speaking as an individual, and as YM Recording Clerk, but NOT as Clerk of the SEYM Ad Hoc Committee on Organizational Documents, and NOT on behalf of that Committee, I would ask EC to hold its policy regarding expense reimbursements for its officers, committee clerks, volunteers, and representatives, in the Light. Notice, for example, that the SEYM Operational Handbook DOES provide reimbursement to the YM Recording Clerk for travel expenses.

The origin of this policy on the non-reimbursement of the expenses of yearly meeting officers, committee clerks and members, was in part a concern that SEYM would not have enough money to pay those expenses. Before accepting a position, in other words, volunteers should con-sider the costs. That policy also stemmed from the then-popular notion that no one should benefit economically from any office or role within SEYM. Being honored with approval to serve was enough. Absorbing the costs of such service was no more than an appropriate response.

That was then. This is now.

Now, the Society of Friends is concerned about economic inequality, white privilege, and the accessibility to all, of membership, service, participation, representation, and fellowship.

Now, the Society of Friends is making intentional efforts to open up opportunities of service and participation to persons at all income levels and from all ethnic origins.

Now, membership, activity, and participation in the Society of Friends are all in significant decline.

For those reasons, I believe EC should now re-consider its expense reimbursement policy as it is currently

expressed in the SEYM Operational Handbook. It should continue to encourage voluntary donations to SEYM from all constituent members, volunteers, and monthly meetings. It should not, however, require involuntary expenditures by its volunteers for all reasonable and necessary costs incurred by them in the full performance of their service or duties, as the price for their service to SEYM. Instead, EC should encourage, not discourage, full, and unrestrained voluntary participation.

The existing policy also distorts the financial reporting of income and expense for the Yearly Meeting; it subverts the testimonies of integrity and transparency; it obscures information about SEYM's operational income and expenses, and, most importantly, about its priorities.

Instead, SEYM should generously reimburse all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by its volunteers, grateful for their donation of their time, talent, experience and judgment.

Such a change in attitude is likely to result in greater participation, greater diversity, greater attendance, greater time, and greater productivity, all without a significant reduction in income.

People will donate money more freely if it is given, rather than extracted. If their service and money are freely donated, they will experience a greater sense of joy and fulfillment. Monthly meetings will likely accept any higher apportionments, knowing that the additional money will be benefit the volunteers serving them at the yearly meeting level. It will come back to them in the form of a stronger yearly meeting community, based upon economic reciprocity.

To that end, I ask EC to authorize the SEYM Ad Hoc Committee on Organizational Documents, to also review, and recommend a new and different expense reimbursement policy.

It has been meeting bi-weekly since October 25, 2023. Dan Vaughen is Clerk and Eileen Zingaro is Recording Clerk.

This Committee was created at the 2023 FIBM:

Friends agree to establish an ad hoc Quaker Call Committee. Dan Vaughen 23FIBM05

agreed to convene the committee, and Eileen Zingaro, Katie Green, Suzanne Frechette, Mercedes Soca, John Palozzi, and Amy Richards agreed to serve.

APPROVED

No charge to this new committee was approved. To clarify its purpose, therefore, and to evaluate its performance, the committee requests that WIBM provide such a charge. To aid in the drafting of such a charge, the committee proposes the following draft:

The SEYM ad hoc Quaker Call Committee is charged with discerning whether, and if so, how, SEYM might now be called to encourage and empower SEYM Monthly Meetings to actively, but non-violently, resist political pressures emanating from governmental entities in Florida intended to counter the principles and values of the Religious Society of Friends. In their discernment, consideration may be given to the establishment of one or more Quaker Schools, Interfaith Conference Centers, or other multiple-Meeting sponsored educational projects likely to benefit the wider community.

During its short existence, the committee has shared experience and research with each other, met with the Executive Director of the Friends Council on Education, and exchanged email with the Chair of the Department of Education, Stetson University, DeLand, Florida.

Having initially inquired about an SEYM partnership with Stetson in the establishment of a Lab School, we are now awaiting word from Stetson about a potential initial collaboration on a summer residency program, located at their DeLand campus.

We are also seeking meetings with representatives from recently established Friends Schools in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Jacksonville, Florida, in the context of exploring the establishment of one or more Friends Schools in Florida. In that same context, we are considering whether any such Florida schools should be physical, virtual, or hybrid, and at what grade level we should begin.

We will provide updates on these activities at FIBM. We will also ask FIBM to approve the addition of Valerie Barlow and Gail Stallings to this committee, and the withdrawal from this committee of Katie Green and Amy Richards. We will also ask for the authority to add or subtract members on this committee in our discretion, to a minimum of three, and a maximum of nine. Finally, we will ask WIBM to delegate to EC any interim decisions that may be required between WIBM and our Annual Gathering, with respect to any potential

SEYM collaboration with Stetson University.

Suggested Workshop/Event Topics

SPECIAL REQUEST!

I am interested in developing some suggestions for Meetings, Worship Groups, and other communities on responding to various needs that may come about to due extreme events, economic hardships, and so on. This process is anticipated to take place online over a several-week period. To be as inclusive as possible, you can drop in as available or participate via email, snail mail, or one-to-one with me. Volunteers are sought from as many Meetings and Worship Groups as interested; however, it will be helpful to have input from persons with social media skills, youths, and anyone!

- **Angelic Troublemaking:** Beyond Bystander Training explores anti-racism/decolonization work with emphasis on local concerns and means of accompaniment.
- Climate Equity/Climate Justice in Our Community: identifies specific local social justice and equity concerns. Participants identify actions to address concerns;

- **Decolonizing Earthcare**: explores the intersectionality of gender, race, extraction, and harmful economic systems and the adverse impacts to the Earth.
- Discerning Earthcare Leadings: listening and sharing experiences to reach individual and group decisions on Earthcare actions;
- Earthcare audits: baseline assessment of individual or community activities and discernment;
- **Equality or Equity? What is Our Testimony?:** examines Friends' equality testimony, the concepts of equity and justice, and the relationship of these to Earthcare;
- Permaculture is Not Just Agriculture: introduces permaculture design and domains and ways to bring these practices into Earthcare;
- **Project Drawdown, Introduction and more:** presents information on actions that "drawdown" carbon emissions and ways to promote drawdown choices as individuals and communities;
- Quakers and Climate Collapse: shares and builds on a Woodbrooke course led by Jackie Carpenter from 2021 Fifth Month (May), including review of the latest science, worship sharing, and discernment.
 - o I also can build on my Pendle Hill presentation to help with local concerns;
- Racial Wealth Gap Simulation: an exercise that helps "... people understand the connections among racial equity, hunger, poverty, and wealth";
- **Transportation, migration, and climate:** explores access and mobility issues from the local to global perspective and the impacts of climate change;
- **Underwater Homeowners Association:** shares local actions that can be undertaken by communities experiencing sea level rise;
- Water: Sea Level Rise, Flooding, and Water Quality explores local, national, and global water issues;
- Waterline Communities: Displacement and Gentrification and Why Quakers Should Care drills down to the county or community level on the impacts of dis-placement; and
- What the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs AND Inflation Reduction Acts Mean to Me and My Community? This workshop looks at how funds from the two acts are being dispersed at the local level and provides suggestions on how to get in-volved in the decision-making process. Special emphasis is given to working with local implementing agencies and collaborating with advocacy groups to address adverse climate and environmental impacts.

As mentioned above, this is a series of meetings to develop guidance for Friends on responding to various needs that may come about to due extreme events, economic hardships, and so on. The proposed number of meetings at this time is four, but may be adjusted as needed. Participants can drop in as available or contribute via email, snail mail, or one-to-one with me. Volunteers are sought from as many Meetings and Worship Groups as interested; however, it will be helpful to have input from persons with social media skills, youths, and anyone! Notice of the first and subsequent online meetings will be provided to individual Meetings, Worship Groups, and the SEYM enewsletter.

Interactions or Collaborations between and among other SEYM committees

These interactions between and among SEYM committees help to facilitate communication and collaboration of our regional concerns with national organizations and to be a Quaker Presence at specific events.

- The Committee for Ministry on Racism (CMOR): I continue to work with this committee with special attention to sharing information and other resources from related committees. We are planning a workshop for the 2024 SEYM Annual Gathering;
- Earthcare Committee:
 - o As part of our agreement with Wekiwa Springs State Park, I worked with the Half Yearly Meeting committee to provide environmental programming. This included a presentation and invitation to the 2024 National Water Dance, 20 Fourth Month (April) 2024, 4:00 PM, https://www.nwdprojects.org/; a presentation by tom kunesh, Standing Rock Lakota descendant, "On Landback & Reparations ~ A Proposal"; and a reading of the Climate Change Theatre Action play, "Undertow", by Keith Barker, read by the Troupe Bohn Jeverly.
 - o I will lead a workshop during the 2024 SEYM Annual Gathering. The work-ing title is "A Friendly Guide to Perma[nent] Culture." It will be beyond agriculture and incorporate some thoughts on Friends' testimonies and ad-vices and queries.
- Florida Council of Churches (FCC): The Florida Council of Churches will 2024 Ad-vocacy Days for the Florida legislative session. Training on issues and legislative meetings will be Monday afternoon, 29 First Month (January), 5:00 PM, Florida People's Advocacy Center, 603 N Martin Luther King Jr Blvd, Tallahassee, FL 32301. An interfaith prayer service for a just society will be held Monday evening. Meetings with legislative offices and committee appearances will occur on 30 First Month. Kathy Hersh and I prepared a guide to share with volunteers and other attendees on meal preparation and related activities. This guide will be made available online.
- Peace and Social Concerns (PSC) Committees: I continue to meet with or otherwise support the Yearly and Monthly Meeting PSC committees;
- Quaker United Nations Office (QUNO), AFSC: Bill Carlie and I now share SEYM appointments to AFSC. I am an AFSC representative on the Quaker United Nations Committee (QUNC);
- Right Sharing of World Resources: I continue to share information through the- QEW United Nations Working Group, AFSC, and Quaker United Nations Commit-tee.
- Youth Committee: I continue to work with the Youth Committee. I will be making a special effort to include youth in the efforts to develop preparedness guidance.

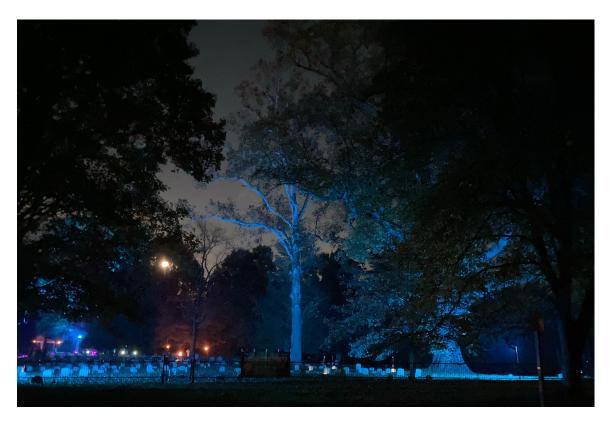
The Wider Quaker World, Interfaith Groups, Other Environmental Organizations

To communicate and collaborate our regional concerns with national organizations including Quaker Earthcare Wit- ness (QEW), Earth Quaker Action Team (EQAT), Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL), and Friends General Conference (FGC). To be a Quaker Presence at specific events, including those arranged by others.

I continue to work with the wider Quaker World, interfaith groups, and environmental organizations. These interactions have been virtual and in person during this period.

FGC Long Range Planning Committee Report

SEYM Winter Interim Business 20 First Month 2024

Host Community description for Virtual Gathering

Long Range Conference Planning committee (LRCP) seeks a community of Friends to act as a hosting community for the Virtual Gathering. This could be a yearly meeting or another community of Friends within the wider population of Friends General Conference (for example, People of Color, Adult Young Friends, FLGBTQC, Fellowship of Quakers in the Arts, etc.). Two communities joining together to co-host may work best in some cases.

For now, these are the aspects of hosting that we see:

- 1. The host community would hold the Gathering in the light and take on a certain sense of ownership, as it helps to shepherd the creative process of building a Gathering.
- 2. The host community would have the opportunity to broadly share their particular ministries and concerns with the wider Quaker population. This could show up in the theme or could guide the general tone of the Gathering.
- 3. The host community would help to find Virtual Gathering co-clerks. We have found that the host community knows of the gifts and talents of potential co-clerks in ways that may not be visible to FGC staff and LRCP.
- 4. The host community would put out a call for Friends to serve on the Gathering Planning Committee. Historically this committee consists of 30-40 Friends, drawn from all across the wider population of Friends, often identified according to their experience or interest in a certain area. Members of LRCP also serve on the Gathering Committee, as well as many who have served on prior Gathering Committees. (Of course, the Gathering Committee for a Virtual Gathering would not have a local arrangements subcommittee, lightening the load considerably for a Virtual Gathering hosting community.)
- 5. With the host community supplying some members (but not responsible to supply all members) of the Gathering Committee, those members could have a voice in selecting workshops and other presentations, and in providing input about the structure and programming of the Virtual Gathering.
- 6. The host community would have the opportunity to recruit some workshop proposals for the Gathering. The workshop selection process includes many considerations, and proposals from members of the host community are sometimes given an advantage.
- 7. Host communities often take an active role in promoting the Gathering within their populations.

Greetings Friends,

As 2023 draws to a close, SEYM Worship and Ministry Committee reflects on work done and that yet to be realized in creating opportunities for all SEYM to deepen their spiritual experience. We find much of our ongoing ministry to be purposeful and engaging, even though we may not always realize how far reaching the impact. We hold our work to be Spirit-led, and offer without attachment or expectation, just a continued leading and prayer that Friends find their way enriched at times and experience a call to seek deeper.

At a recent committee meeting, we gathered with the following reading and query:

Reading:

... Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched, and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold...

Matthew 13:5-8

Gathering Query: Where am I withered or choked or scorched or rootless? Where is my good soil? And thus is the query we would put forward for SEYM, whether taken as individuals, or an organization. So many Friends feel exhausted and stretched beyond our ability to find empathy, to reach out with peace, and to listen in love. We ask Friends to acknowledge whither they are withered, with the understanding that they yet have good soil, always.

Worship and Ministry continues to seek to spiritually nurture in the following:

- Extended Meeting for Worship opportunities, once per quarter
- Weekly Queries for the Journey; used by individuals and MMs/WGs
- Bi-weekly Seekers Book Club (next book-- Listening to the Light: How to Bring Quaker Simplicity and Integrity into Our Lives, by Jim Pym)
- Online Programs: Emily Provance, NYYM, is scheduled for 26 Second Month, 2024; Tim Gee, General Secretary of FWCC, will be scheduled later in 2024; more to come
- Online discussions of basic Quaker concepts are being discerned
- Pastoral Care—prayer and care for individual Friends as well as holding a concern for Meetings that are dwindling in numbers and energy. A request was made for Friends to join Palm Beach Meeting for Worship, whether in person or via zoom (see link on their website). Zoom is a good way to gather with other Friends in worship, especially if distance is a hardship.

Michener Lecture 2024 takes place 21 First Month 2024 at Orlando Meetinghouse. Ann Jerome (Orlando MM, Deland WG, Pendle Hill Friend in Residence) will share a ministry that is deeply rooted in Spirit. Her title is "Let it Burn: A Call for Attention to the Fires of Our Faith".

We again ask Executive Committee, as a matter of integrity, to continue to follow through on recommendations made by the Listening Project that were provided at Summer EC 2023. These requests were made by MMs/WGs and reflect a need for connection and transparency.

We hold all of SEYM in the Light, on our hearts, and in our prayers, that each Friend may find the peace and strength they need each day, in whatever may be needed as God wants.
